# EDUCATION

Peterson's Two-Year Colleges 2021 (2020). Denver, CO: Peterson's. 298 pages. (L 901 P48 2020 AC; Acc. No. 5999)

Includes information on more than 1,700 accredited two-year undergraduate institutions in the United States and Canada, as well as some international schools. It also features a number of detailed twopage school descriptions written by admissions personnel. In addition, offers articles that cover tips on transferring, advice for adults returning to school, "green" programs at community colleges, the basics of financial aid, and much more.

Peterson's Four-Year Colleges 2021 (2020). Denver, CO: Peterson's. 1295 pages. (L 901 P48 2020 AC; Acc. No. 6000)

Includes information on every accredited four-year undergraduate institution in the United States and Canada (and many international schools)—more than 2,500 institutions in all. It also includes detailed two-page school descriptions written by admissions personnel for approximately 100 colleges and universities. # LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

Kehe, David and Kehe, Peggy Dustin (2012). Discussion Strategies: Beyond Everyday Conversation. 2nd ed. Vermont: Pro Lingua Associates. 220 pages. (P 95.45 K44 2012 AC; Acc. No. 5994)

Develops discussion skills at high levels of communicative interaction, especially communication in academic settings. Students, in step-by-step procedures, are given extensive practice in a variety of strategies for leading and participating in a discussion.

It also provides focused practice with the following discussion techniques: using rejoinders, asking follow-up questions, seeking and giving clarification, using comprehension checks, answering with details, soliciting more details from others, interrupting others during a discussion, recounting something they have heard, volunteering an answer, helping the leader of a discussion, expressing an opinion, referring to a source when giving an opinion, and leading a discussion.

Cullen, Pauline; French, Amanda; and Jakeman, Vanessa (2014). The Official Cambridge Guide to IELTS: for Academic & General Training. Italy: Cambridge University Press. 402 pages. (PE 1128 C85 2014 AC ; Acc. No. 6011)

Cater to the preparation for IELTS Academic or General Training. Understand the test and improve your score with advice, tips and clear explanations. Malu, Kathleen F. (2018). English Clubs: The Concise Guide for Leaders and Members. Washington, DC: OELP. 134 pages. (PN 4130 M35 2018 AC; Acc. No. 6007)

Aims to provide strategies for creating and sustaining an English club by providing ideas that will excite, inspire, and encourage people to practice English and create positive changes in their communities. The focus of this guide is on practicing English, not on teaching English, although some sections include definitions of useful vocabulary and expressions.

Ashley, Seth; Roberts, Jessica; Maksl, Adam (2019). American Journalism and "Fake News". Santa Barbara, CA: ABC-CLIO. 239 pages. (PN 4867.2 A84 2019 AC; Acc. No. 6006)

Provides a comprehensive and impartial overview of the state of American journalism and news-gathering in the 21st century, with a special focus on the rise—and meaning—of "fake news."

Illustrates the strengths and weaknesses of journalistic practices so readers can feel empowered to navigate the complex information environment in which we live and to understand the level to which various news sources can (or can't) be trusted to provide accurate and timely coverage of issues and events of import to the public and the nation. These skills and knowledge structures are necessary for any citizen who wishes to be an informed participant in a self-governing democratic society.

# SCIENCE

Bilimoria, Diana and Lord, Linley, eds. (2014). Women in STEM Careers: International Perceptions on Increasing Workforce Participation Advancement and Leadership. Cheltenham, UK: Edward Edgar. 256 pages. (Q 130 W66 2014 AC; Acc. No. 5995)

Explores the nature of STEM careers across industry and academia, and presents the latest thinking on successful individual, organizational and educational initiatives related to women in STEM. Along with a select group of international contributors, Diana Bilimoria and Linley Lord provide a fresh perspective, based on success stories and successful initiatives, augmenting contemporary perspectives on the barriers and issues that women in STEM careers continue to face.

It is a positive and insightful outlook on gender relations, which will be an invaluable resource for scholars, practitioners and policy-makers in organizations, human resources, academia, and government, as well as for women aspiring to or presently working in STEM fields.

# TECHNOLOGY

Lang, David (2017). Make: Zero to Maker: A Beginner's Guide to the Skills, Tools, and Ideas of the Maker Movement. 2nd ed. San Francisco, CA: Maker Media Inc. 248 pages. (T 40 L36 2017 AC; Acc. No. 5979) Follows the author's personal journey of transformation into a maker-entrepreneur. It is everyone's guide to combining inspiration and resources to effectively navigate this exciting new world.

The author reveals how he became a maker pro after losing his job and how the experience helped him start OpenROV, a DIY community and product line focused on underwater robotics.

Burleson, Todd (2018). The Green Screen Makerspace Project Book. New York: McGraw-Hill. 133 pages. (TR 858 B87 2018 AC; Acc. No. 5996)

Features 25 low-cost DIY projects that include materials lists, start-to-finish instructions, and detailed photos. You will get coverage of software that readers at any skill level, in any makerspace—from a library to a living room—can use to produce videos with high-quality green screen effects.

Marvin, Danielle and Panjwani, Alisha (2016). Start Making!: A Guide to Engaging Young People in Maker Activities. San Francisco, CA: Maker Media Inc. 198 pages. (TS 171.57 M37 2016 AC; Acc. No. 5980)

Exemplifies the broad range of highly personalized, limit-pushing project possibilities of 3D printing when combined with affordable electronic components and materials.


